Peter Abelard, Helen Waddell.

(Henry Holt and Co, 1933).

Peter Abelard, philosopher, theologian and logician ran afoul of major figures of the Church. His love affair with Eloise of Argenteuil is one of the most famous love stories of the Middle Ages. Would their story have unfolded differently in a different time with a different theological ethos?

Pernicious Individualism

The Second Mountain: The Quest for a Moral Life, David Brooks.

(Random House, 2019).

In exploring the four commitments that are usually take to define a life of meaning and purpose, this is a provocative social commentary about how our individualism has led us away from rooting ourselves in a neighbourhood and binding ourselves to other people in social solidarity and love. □

This 14th century text is one of the great classics of English mysticism. Is there a Scriptural warrant for this?

This is an excellent discussion of the process of how we learn to “love our enemies”, unpacking three important steps that we can take to make our world a better place. This book is America focused, but the problems of our modern world are universal, it seems.
