First Reading

Reader: A Reading from the Book of Numbers.

The Israelites became impatient on the way. The people spoke against God and against Moses, “Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? For there is no food and no water, and we detest this miserable food.” Then the LORD sent poisonous serpents among the people, and they bit the people, so that many Israelites died. The people came to Moses and said, “We have sinned by speaking against the LORD and against you; pray to the LORD to take away the serpents from us.” So Moses prayed for the people. And the LORD said to Moses, “Make a poisonous serpent, and set it on a pole; and everyone who is bitten shall look at it and live.” So Moses made a serpent of bronze, and put it upon a pole; and whenever a serpent bit someone, that person would look at the serpent of bronze and live.

Second Reading

Reader: A Reading from the First Letter of Paul to the Corinthians.

For the message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. For it is written, "I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart."

Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, God decided, through the foolishness of our proclamation, to save those who believe. For Jews demand signs and Greeks desire wisdom, but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, but to those who are the called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God.

Leader: You stretched out your arms on the hard wood of the cross:

All: That the whole world may come within your reach.

Leader: We pray for the world, for whom God sent his only begotten son in sacrifice. Bless all who struggle and strive to do your will in this broken world. Nurture and sustain us as we seek ways to heal what we have hurt.

A long pause is observed. Please give voice to your prayers or offer them in silence.

Leader: You stretched out your arms on the hard wood of the cross:

All: That the whole world may come within your reach.

Leader: Look with mercy on those for whom Jesus came to die, especially those who are sick and suffering, lonely or lost, as we offer their names to you in prayer.

A long pause is observed. Please give voice to your prayers or offer them in silence.

Leader: Help us to remember when we suffer, that you suffer with us, O God, in the person of Jesus, and that casting all our fears upon him, we may find peace and wholeness.

You stretched out your arms on the hard wood of the cross:

All: That the whole world may come within your reach.

Leader: We pray for those who have died. Welcome into paradise all who have passed on to eternity to be in your presence.

A long pause is observed. Please give voice to your prayers or offer them in silence.

Leader: Rest eternal grant unto them, O Lord. And let light perpetual shine upon them. May they rest in peace and rise in glory. May all share in the resurrection of Jesus in communion with all your saints

You stretched out your arms on the hard wood of the cross:

All: That the whole world may come within your reach.

Leader: Dear God, we thank you for transforming an instrument of death and despair into a symbol of hope and new life. We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you for all that you are.
