

Reader: The Gospel of Christ.







Thanksgiving Flipgrid

Worship with Your Wealth: Responsible Investing for Creation Care

Join Peter Bennett for this presentation on socially responsible investing. Responsible investment refers to the incorporation of environmental, social and governance factors into the selection and management of investments. After reviewing and considering this concept using both scripture and the history of the church's role in responsible investing, guidelines on how to choose responsible investments will be presented.

There are many ways that we can learn to "live in the family of earth". A desired outcome of this workshop is to inform and guide the participants to use their investments to achieve environmental and social goals.

Two sessions will be offered: Monday, October 26 (7-9 PM) and Tuesday, October 27 (2-4 PM). There will be a maximum of 20 participants at each session and registration is required through the links provided above.
