



It is he who sits above the circle of the earth, and its inhabitants are like grasshoppers; who stretches out the heavens like a curtain, and spreads them like a tent to live in; who brings princes to naught, and makes the rulers of the earth as nothing. 



Priest: We believe in Jesus,


born in obscurity in an occupied land; a human being, vulnerable to hunger, thirst, persecution and grief.



Lent-in-a-Bag – A Message from our Incumbent

Dear Friends,

One of the significant moments in the rhythm of our lives in faith is our observance of a Holy Lent. It is the time in our liturgical life when we are intentional about our faith journey from the sobering prayers of Ash Wednesday to the first spark of the Easter Vigil, as the light of Christ's resurrection bursts forth in the darkness.

It is a pilgrimage we have always walked together as a community. And even though the pandemic caught us mid-step last year - forcing us to take other roads and change some of our familiar practices - we still made our journey through Lent together, and were faithful in being more fervent in prayer and more generous in the works of love.

This year brings further challenges as we will not be able to gather as a community and observe Ash Wednesday, with the poignant and humbling ashen crosses that would typically adorn our foreheads. So this year we are offering "Lent-in-a-Bag" - so that we remain one in our pilgrimage through Lent, despite being separated from one another. While we want the specific contents to be a surprise, it is important to note that each bag

will contain resources for each Sunday in Lent, including the symbols that guide us in that journey. It will begin with Ash Wednesday. Inside each bag there will be a small, sealed, pyx containing ashes from our own spent palm crosses. You are invited to apply these during our Ash Wednesday liturgy and use the other resources contained in the bag to deepen your experience during the forty days of Lent.

Strategic Plan Update

While the trio working on Resourcing for Mission reported in November and received encouragement from the Board of Management we have not progressed with our plan.

We believe that the plan is sound - to be listening first and planning later. In the time since the last Board of Management meeting, the pandemic realities have forced a number of Church and other organizations to push off significant projects or events into late 2021 or even into 2022. (Canterbury Cathedral scaled back it's commemoration of the 850th anniversary of the martyrdom of Thomas Becket until 2021 or 2022. What's two years after 850? Just a round number.)

So with all that is happening we, again, are uncertain when to begin: Before Vestry, after Vestry, as part of the 150th, after the 150th.

At a recent Executive Committee meeting we agreed to provide an interim report or note to the Board of Management, Staying Connected (if appropriate), *The Gathering*, the 2020 Vestry Book.

An Update from the Refugee Settlement Committee

COVID has affected us all, from here in downtown Toronto to the entire world. While it has been two years since Church of the Redeemer last sponsored a group of refugees (4 young men from Eritrea), the committee has continued meeting occasionally, both to share our own circumstances and to exchange news and maintain hope that we will be able to welcome another group once travel restrictions are lifted.

The committee is working with AURA (Anglican United Refugee Alliance) to sponsor a Somali family of 7, currently living in a Kenyan refugee camp. We hope that they will be able to arrive by 2022.

Following up on the 2020 Season of Creation, Learning@Redeemer in collaboration with Creation Matters presented a 30-Day Challenge. Each day, a member of The Redeemer community offered a reflection on our place in Creation with a related call to action. The responses were thoughtful, creative, and hopeful! The 30-Day Challenge is now available on the Creation Matters@Redeemer webpage. Please take up the challenge, but don't stop on day 30, just repeat!

Intercessions

In the prayers of the people each Sunday, space is left for members of the community to add a name or concern in chat. If you have people or situations that you would like included in the service but are not comfortable giving voice to them, there is a prayer request form on the website. Parish Cycle of Prayer

Each month a cycle of prayer is available <u>online</u>. This resource provides the names of ministries from the Anglican Communion, the Indigenous cycle of prayer, the diocese and our community to hold in our prayers each day. In peace we pray. Lord, Hear our prayer.
