

Then Samuel went to Ramah; and Saul went up to his house in Gibeah of Saul. Samuel did not see Saul again until the day of his death, but Samuel grieved over Saul. And the LORD was sorry that he had made Saul king over Israel.

The LORD said to Samuel, "How long will you grieve over Saul? I have rejected him from being king over Israel. 

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### **Ministry Updates**

#### A Message from Our Incumbent

Dear Friends,

Both the diocese and the province are now allowing worship to take place in the church, observing all the existing health and safety protocols.

The diocese is encouraging individual communities to decide whether they feel safe and ready to resume worship in their, cherished, sacred spaces.

We are all eager to return to the church when it is safe to do so. The steps we must take to make that possible have already begun. Many have received their first vaccine and are

scheduled for a second dose sometime over the summer. We already have, established, best practices from our experience last fall that allowed us to worship with one another in the church, but remain safe at the same time. However, despite these encouraging steps, we are going to postpone in-person gathering in the church until the fall. We are making this decision so that we may all be safe.

As you may recall from our Vestry meeting, our air-handling system is no longer functioning adequately. Of the eight compressors that control our air conditioning and ventilation needs, only three are working - and those only service our lower level. In other words, there is no air conditioning or ventilation for the church. Given the spread of new COVID variants, we believe it would not be prudent to return to worship in the church until this situation is resolved.

We are currently securing quotes to expedite the needed replacements/repairs and hope to begin the work shortly, with a view to completing it as soon as possible.

In the meantime, we will continue to worship via Zoom, offer in-person participation at our Garden Eucharists, and devise a comprehensive plan for the fall that includes in-person worship in the church and a continued on-line worship experience going forward.

We thank you for your patience and are interested in your thoughts and comments, as always.

Between Angels & Beasts: The Book of Daniel: June 6, 13, 20

Set during Israel exile in Babylon, the Book of Daniel weaves tales of political resistance with visions of monsters. The book has something to say about what it means to be human, and about how to hold onto our humanity inside a dehumanizing culture. (Plus it is full of prophetic fever dreams, so there will be something for everyone.)

Lovers in a Dangerous Time: The Song of Songs: July 4, 11, 18

Early Jewish tradition forbid the young from reading Scripture's most erotic book: the Song of Songs. All these years later, without any official prohibition, the Church still tends to leave this book unread. In the middle of this summer Marginalia will explore the Song's drama of love, its celebration of fleshly joys, and the way it tangles God up in the bedsheets of human longing.

#### Compline at 8 PM

Compline is a Christian tradition of bedtime prayers. These traditional prayers unveil God's grace in all of our endings - the day's end, the week's end, and our last nightfall.

#### National Indigenous History Month - Bell Ringing

Beginning on Monday, May 31 and every Monday throughout the month of June, the Church of the Redeemer's bell will toll seven times at noon every four seconds to honour the missing Indigenous women and girls across Canada. The number seven is to acknowledge the <a href="Seven Grandfather Teachings">Seven Grandfather Teachings</a>, while the four seconds is in reference to the four directions of The Medicine Wheel.

### **Voices For Peace – Radical Hope: Radical Resistance**

Voices for Peace explores the radical Christian praxis of peace and non-violence. Redeemer, along with Citizens for Public Justice, the Henri Nouwen Society, the Basilian Centre for Peace and Justice, and the Canadian Council of Churches, sponsors the conference.

The second event in the Voices for Peace series is on **Wednesday**, **June 16** at 7 PM. The speakers, Leah Gazan and Terry LeBlanc, will facilitate our reflection on reconciliation. The history of the relationship of Church and State with Indigenous peoples has been described by Canada's Truth and Reconciliation Commission as one of "cultural genocide." How do we acknowledge this violence, and then proceed to create the conflicts that produced the protests at Standing Rock and in Wet'suwet'en territory? How might we, as peacemakers, foster healing and reconciliation? We begin by listening, and then take the challenging step of reimagining what we thought we knew.
