Archdeacon Val Kerr - Wolf Clan, Member of the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte which is part of the Six Nations Confederacy.

I am a committed, friendly and hardworking person with a passion for social justice. In my current role as the Archdeacon of Truth, Reconciliation and Indigenous Ministry for the Diocese of Niagara, I endeavour to teach the history of Turtle Island from the time of European arrival in this country. It is very important to me that people learn the real history of this country we call Canada. We need to face the truth, acknowledge that truth and then work towards reconciliation.

As a priest I served at St.Geroge's, St Catharines for ten years, then at St John the Evangelist in Niagara Falls for three years and finally at All Saints Hagersville on a very part time basis while continuing in my primary role in truth and reconciliation. I am a widow, a mother, mother-in-law, grandmother, grandmother-in-law, great grandmother, sister, auntie and friend. I attended seminary at Huron University College in London ON where I graduated with my MDiv. My classes' first day of class started on 9/11 a day we will all remember well. Before seminary I worked in Palliative care for thirteen years. A position where I walked with patients and their families as they completed their earthly journey.

My wonderful family is my two sons, their wives, eight grandchildren and eight great grandchildren. I believe strongly in life-long learning and hope I have passed the love of learning to my family.

PWRDF's Mapping the Ground We Stand On - Virtual Workshop

Mapping the Ground We Stand On is an interactive educational resource developed by the Primate's World Relief & Development Fund/PWRDF in response to the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's 94 Calls to Action. The workshop on **Saturday, October 23** from 2:00 to 4:30 PM, offers Indigenous and settler participants an opportunity to explore their historic and current place on the map of Canada and their relationship to one another.

The online version of the Mapping Exercise uses elements of animation, stories, videos, breakout rooms and plenary format to offer opportunities for learning and reflection on the concepts of Terra Nullius (Empty Land), the Doctrine of Discovery, and Indigenous Traditional Knowledge. This experience enables individuals and groups to imagine what personal and collective journeys toward a just, respectful and healing relationship might look like.

The online workshop will be led by Suzanne Rumsey of PWRDF, a co-facilitator and with the help of an Indigenous elder. Register <u>here</u>, it is limited to **20** participants. A Zoom link will be sent to participants several days prior to the workshop.
