First Reading

Reader: A Reading from the First Book of Samuel.

On the day when Elkanah sacrificed, he would give portions to his wife Peninnah and to all her sons and daughters; but to Hannah he gave a double portion, because he loved her, though the Lord had closed her womb. Her rival used to provoke her severely, to irritate her, because the Lord had closed her womb. So it went on year by year; as often as she went up to the house of the Lord, she used to provoke her. Therefore Hannah wept and would not eat. Her husband Elkanah said to her, "Hannah, why do you weep? Why do you not eat? Why is your heart sad? Am I not more to you than ten sons?" After they had eaten and drunk at Shiloh, Hannah rose and presented herself before the Lord. Now Eli the priest was sitting on the seat beside the doorpost of the temple of the Lord. She was deeply distressed and prayed to the Lord, and wept bitterly. She made this vow: "O Lord of hosts, if only you will look on the misery of your servant, and remember me, and not forget your servant, but will give to your servant a male child, then I will set him before you as a nazirite until the day of his death. He shall drink neither wine nor intoxicants, and no razor shall touch his head." As she continued praying before the Lord, Eli observed her mouth. Hannah was praying silently; only her lips moved, but her voice was not heard; therefore Eli thought she was drunk. So Eli said to her, "How long will you make a drunken spectacle of yourself? Put away your wine." But Hannah answered, "No, my lord, I am a woman deeply troubled; I have drunk neither wine nor strong drink, but I have been pouring out my soul before the Lord. Do not regard your servant as a worthless woman, for I have been speaking out of my great anxiety and vexation all this time." Then Eli


answered, "Go in peace; the God of Israel grant the petition you have made to him." And she said, "Let your servant find favour in your sight." Then the woman went to her quarters, ate and drank with her husband, and her countenance was sad no longer. They rose early in the morning and worshipped before the Lord; then they went back to their house at Ramah. Elkanah knew his wife Hannah, and the Lord remembered her. In due time Hannah conceived and bore a son. She named him Samuel, for she said, "I have asked him of the Lord."

Second Reading


Reader: A Reading from the Letter to the Hebrews.

And every priest stands day after day at his service, offering again and again the same sacrifices that can never take away sins. But when Christ had offered for all time a single sacrifice for sins, "he sat down at the right hand of God", and since then has been waiting "until his enemies would be made a footstool for his feet." For by a single offering he has perfected for all time those who are sanctified. Therefore, my friends, since we have confidence to enter the sanctuary by the blood of Jesus, by the new and living way that he opened for us through the curtain (that is, through his flesh), and since we have a great priest over the house of God, let us approach with a true heart in full assurance of faith, with our hearts sprinkled clean from an evil conscience and our bodies washed with pure water. Let us hold fast to the confession of our hope without wavering, for he who has promised is faithful. And let us consider how to provoke one another to love and good deeds, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day approaching.

The Prayers of the People

Leader: In today's readings, we read stories of sacrifice, the sacrifice by Hannah of her first born. Later we read of Jesus' sacrifice of himself for our sins. Finally, we read of the impending sacrifice of the temple, which foretells the birth of something new and greater than stones and buildings. What is the sacrifice we offer, in hope and expectation of God's promise being fulfilled?

Leader: There is no Holy One, no Rock like our God

All: Who answered my request, who heard my cry.

Leader: We pray for the church throughout the world. We pray especially for churches that are coming to grips with their colonial past and need healing and reconciliation with those whom they have harmed by their past behaviour. We pray especially for the Roman Catholic Church in Canada, and for Pope Francis' upcoming visit to Canada.

A long pause is observed. Please give voice to your prayers or offer them in silence.

Leader: There is no Holy One, no Rock like our God

All: Who answered my request, who heard my cry.

Leader: We pray for the world. We remember the victims of war, famine, and climate change. We pray especially for the delegates to COP26, concluding this weekend in Glasgow. We pray for a sacrifice of status, position, greed, possessiveness and other behaviour that separates us from a holy stewardship of your creation.

A long pause is observed. Please give voice to your prayers or offer them in silence.

Leader: There is no Holy One, no Rock like our God

All: Who answered my request, who heard my cry.

Leader: In our own country, we pray for all political leaders, remembering especially the members of parliament who are returning to the House of Commons next week. Give them the courage to sacrifice ego and partisanship in favour of justice and equality.

Leader: In our own community we give thanks for all who sacrifice their time, talent, and treasure to advocate, to reconcile, to comfort, to feed, to provide community and sanctuary.

Be with those who are sick or in distress. Support those who care for their loved ones.

A long pause is observed. Please give voice to your prayers or offer them in silence.

Leader: There is no Holy One, no Rock like our God

All: Who answered my request, who heard my cry.

Leader: We give thanks for those who sacrificed their health or their life in the service of their country, whatever we may feel about the justness of war. They were called to serve and we remember their sacrifice.

We give thanks for the life and witness for those whom we know who have died.

Comfort those who mourn. Bring healing. Bring peace.

A long pause is observed. Please give voice to your prayers or offer them in silence.

Leader: There is no Holy One, no Rock like our God

All: Who answered my request, who heard my cry.

Leader: In all our prayers we give you thanks for all the blessings you have bestowed on us, your wonderful creation, this community, our families, the freedoms we enjoy, the resources we share, the songs we hum, the jokes we laugh at, (even the Dad jokes!), the tears of joy and sorrow we shed.

All that is good and right in this world is of you, O Lord, our strength and our Redeemer.

All: Amen.

In Christ your Son enemies are reconciled, debts forgiven and strangers made welcome.


Your Spirit frees us to live as children in our Father's house.


