All: Most merciful God, we confess that we have sinned in thought, word and deed. We have not loved you with our whole heart. We have not loved our neighbours as ourselves. In your mercy forgive what we have been, help us to amend what we are,and direct what we shall be; that we may do justly, love mercy, and walk humbly with you, our God. Amen. Leader: May the God of all hope free us from our sins, heal us by the Holy Spirit and raise us to new life in Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Refrain



Lord, you have been our refuge from one generation to another. Before the mountains were brought forth or the land and the earth were born from age to age you are God. **Refrain**

Scripture Reading

Reader: A Reading from the Book of the Prophet Isaiah.

I shall wait eagerly for the Lord, who is hiding his face from the house of Jacob; I shall watch longingly for him. ... People will say to you, 'Seek guidance from ghosts and familiar spirits which squeak and gibber; a nation may surely consult its gods, consult its dead on behalf of the living for instruction or a message.' They will surely say some such thing, but what they say has no force. So despondency and fear will come over them, and when they are afraid and fearful, they will rebel against their king and their gods. Whether they turn their gaze upwards or look down, everywhere is distress and darkness inescapable, constraint and gloom that cannot be avoided; for there is no escape for an oppressed people. Formerly the lands of Zebulun and Naphtali were lightly regarded, but afterwards honour was bestowed on Galilee of the Nations on the road beyond Jordan to the sea. The people that walked in darkness have seen a great light; on those who lived in a land as dark as death a light has dawned. You have increased their joy and given them great gladness; they rejoice in your presence as those who rejoice at harvest, as warriors exult when dividing spoil. For you have broken the yoke that burdened them, the rod laid on their shoulders, the driver's goad, as on the day of Midian's defeat. The boots of earthshaking armies on the march, the soldiers' cloaks rolled in blood, all are destined to be burnt, food for the fire.

Reader: The word of the Lord. *People:* Thanks be to God.

Poem for Reflection

Reader: Listen to the poem "Prayer," by Keetje Kuipers:

Perhaps as a child you had the chicken pox and your mother, to soothe you in your fever or to help you fall asleep, came into your room and read to you from some favorite book, *Charlotte's Web* or *Little House on the Prairie*, a long story that she quietly took you through until your eyes became magnets for your shuttering lids and she saw your breathing go slow. And then she read on, this time silently and to herself, not because she didn't know the story, it seemed to her that there had never been a time when she didn't know this story—the young girl and her benevolence, the young girl in her sod housebut because she did not yet want to leave your side though she knew there was nothing more she could do for you. And you, not asleep but simply weak, listened to her turn the pages, still feeling the lamp warm against one cheek, knowing the shape of the rocking chair's shadow as it slid across your chest. So that now, these many years later, when you are clenched in the damp fist of a hospital bed, or signing the papers that say you won't love him anymore, when you are bent at your son's gravesite or haunted by a war that makes you wake with the gun cocked in your hand, you would like to believe that such generosity comes from God, too, who now, when you have the strength to ask, might begin the story again, just as your mother would, from the place where you have both left off.

Prayers in Word

Please rise, as you are able

Leader: Dear friends, we live in the shadow of death, but are promised a light that's not our own. Let's pray to the God who finds us at the end of ourselves.

Almighty God, we have worn ourselves down trying to hide our faces from our fragility and mortality. Teach us to number our days with wise hearts and unclenched fists.

A long pause is observed. Please give voice to your prayers or offer them in silence.

Leader: Lord of our dust,

All: come, hold us together.

Leader: Some of us have fallen prey to death and darkness; some of us have befriended death and let its shadow fall over others. How long will you let us languish? *A long pause is observed. Please give voice to your prayers or offer them in silence.*

Leader: Lord of our darkness,

All: come with the dawn.

Leader: You alone hold the frayed ends of our lives, the lives of those we love, and the life of this world. When will you at last weave these loose threads together? *A long pause is observed. Please give voice to your prayers or offer them in silence.*

Leader: Lord of our stories,

All: write us a new ending.

Leader: Almighty God, in this season of waiting, we look out past the edges of ourselves to the One in whom all lines converge, Jesus Christ, our hope in life and death.

All: Amen.

Symbolic Gesture

All come forward and offer handfuls of earth with the words, "earth to earth, ashes to ashes, dust to dust."



Drop down, O hea-vens, from a-bove, and let the skies pour down right-eous-ness.

Do not be angry beyond measure, O Lord, and do not remember iniquity for ever: Your holy cities are a wilderness, Zion is a wilderness, Jerusalem a desolation: our holy and our beautiful house, where our forebears worshipped you. **Refrain**

We have sinned and are as an unclean thing, and we all fade as a leaf: and our iniquities, like the wind, have taken us away; you have hidden your face from us: and have consumed us, because of our iniquities. **Refrain**

You are my witnesses, says the Lord, and my servants whom I have chosen; that you may know me and believe me: I, even I, am the Lord, and beside me there is no Saviour: and there is no one who can deliver out of my hand. **Refrain**

Comfort, O comfort my people, my salvation shall not tarry: I have blotted out as a thick cloud your transgressions: Fear not, for I will save you: for I am the Lord your God, the Holy One of Israel, your Redeemer. **Refrain**

Leader: Be with us, Lord, in all endings, and direct our way safely home to you, that among the changes and chances of this mortal life, we may be always defended by your gracious help; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Becoming a Pilgrim

The results of the on-line questionnaire about pilgrimage indicate that there is considerable interest both in undertaking a pilgrimage to Spain and local ones close to home. Therefore, the Committee is proposing a parish Camino to Santiago in mid-September of 2022, with two possible starting points. The first begins in the village of O'Cebreiro and would mean a pilgrimage of about nine days; the second in the city of Sarria and would take approximately six to seven. As well we will plan a series of local pilgrimages in and around the GTA, beginning in Eastertide of next year and continuing into the autumn.
