# Advent Feria

Wednesday, December 8, 2021

We enter into a time of quiet. We offer to God our selves and in the silence know that God embraces us as God's very own. We offer our hopes and our concerns through our prayers and in the silence listen for God. Today we hold in our prayers the ordinary moments in life—the trials and the joys.

We begin by saying

God will speak peace to his people, to those who turn to him in their hearts.

## The First Reading

The wilderness and the dry land shall be glad, the desert shall rejoice and blossom; like the crocus it shall blossom abundantly, and rejoice with joy and singing.

The glory of Lebanon shall be given to it, the majesty of Carmel and Sharon.

They shall see the glory of the LORD, the majesty of our God.

Strengthen the weak hands,
and make firm the feeble knees.

Say to those who are of a fearful heart,
'Be strong, do not fear!

Here is your God.
He will come with vengeance,
with terrible recompense.
He will come and save you.'

Then the eyes of the blind shall be opened, and the ears of the deaf unstopped; then the lame shall leap like a deer, and the tongue of the speechless sing for joy. For waters shall break forth in the wilderness, and streams in the desert: the burning sand shall become a pool, and the thirsty ground springs of water; the haunt of jackals shall become a swamp, the grass shall become reeds and rushes. A highway shall be there, and it shall be called the Holy Way; the unclean shall not travel on it, but it shall be for God's people; no traveller, not even fools, shall go astray. No lion shall be there.

nor shall any ravenous beast come up on it; they shall not be found there, but the redeemed shall walk there.

And the ransomed of the LORD shall return,

and come to Zion with singing; everlasting joy shall be upon their heads;

they shall obtain joy and gladness, and sorrow and sighing shall flee away.

## The Gospel Reading

One day, while he was teaching, Pharisees and teachers of the law were sitting nearby (they had come from every village of Galilee and Judea and from Jerusalem); and the power of the Lord was with him to heal. Just then some men came, carrying a paralysed man on a bed. They were trying to bring him in and lay him before Jesus; but finding no way to bring him in because of the crowd, they went up on the roof and let him down with his bed through the tiles into the middle of the crowd in front of Jesus. When he saw their faith, he said, 'Friend, your sins are forgiven you.' Then the scribes and the Pharisees began to question, 'Who is this who is speaking blasphemies? Who can forgive sins but God alone?' When Jesus perceived their questionings, he answered them, 'Why do you raise such questions in your hearts? Which is easier, to say, "Your sins are forgiven you", or to say, "Stand up and walk"? But so that you may know that the Son of Man has authority on earth to forgive sins'—he said to the one who was paralysed—'I say to you, stand up and take your bed and go to your home.' Immediately he stood up

before them, took what he had been lying on, and went to his home, glorifying God. Amazement seized all of them, and they glorified God and were filled with awe, saying, 'We have seen strange things today.'

#### The Reflection

"Sorrow and Sighing Shall Flee Away" *Isaiah 35* 

Here we are in my favourite season of Advent. One of its appeals is that it is so counter cultural. As the rest of the world wallows in shopping for stuff, we are deep in the wilderness waiting with the prophets of old and Jesus and John the Baptist. And what are we waiting for? Why are we commanded to keep awake? How can God's promise to turn darkness into light really come true? Ah...just wait. Light another candle every Sunday. Open one more door on your Advent calendars. Flood your ears with the hymns of the season and wait!

In this era of expected instant gratification, this is not an easy thing to do, so I recommend you turn to the words of my favourite wordsmith the prophet Isaiah. He paints vivid scenes of a reclaimed world when God's vision actually can become our vision here on earth and "the wolf will live with the lamb, the leopard shall lie down with the calf ...and a little child will lead them." Or savour these images from today's portion of Isaiah 35. "The wilderness and the dry land shall be glad, the desert shall rejoice and blossom...the

eyes of the blind shall be opened, and the ears of the deaf unstopped...and sorrow and sighing shall flee away." These words capture our hearts and vision every single year but, this year as we continue on this uncertain path of Covid variants appearing and visceral hate mongering over vaccines and floods in British Columbia and... and... are we not even thirstier for these words of hope and new life which Isaiah offers?

A number of years ago I wrote my first and only psalm. It is harder to do than imagined. One of the sources I consulted suggested following the letters of the alphabet. So I did. It was the beginning of Advent, so I humbly typed in the first line.

A voice in the wilderness calls...and it continued on right through to Zion's dream coming true. I offer it to you now and invite you to write your own keeping in mind the words of Isaiah that sorrow and sighing shall flee away.

My Advent Psalm

A voice in the wilderness calls,
