Just as the streetscape around us has evolved over the years, our members have changed to reflect the growing, vibrant and progressive Christian community found at the Redeemer today.

We are students, workers, retired, homeless, not limited by sexual orientation, gender identity or personal history. We recognize that our church dwells on the traditional lands of the Wendat, the Haudenosaunee and the Anishinaabe Nations, including the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation. Holy One, help us to repent of all that we have done, and to make peace with those whom we have wronged, through Jesus Christ our Redeemer. Amen.

Give us the food and the hope we need for today.


Forgive us our wrongdoing as we forgive the wrongs done to us.

Mid-day Prayer

Members of our community gather for mid-day prayer **Monday through Saturday** on Zoom at **12:15 PM**. Tasting God: The Last Supper in Medieval Art

Jesus's last meal with the disciples before his crucifixion was a frequent subject in art long before Leonardo da Vinci's Last Supper. In this Zoom event one week before Maundy Thursday, we'll explore depictions of the Last Supper in manuscripts, sculpture, and architecture from the 12th to 14th centuries. We'll see how the Last Supper is connected with other events during Holy Week in these depictions. We'll investigate how medieval Christians might have experienced intimate connection with Jesus's own body and blood in Holy Communion, and discuss what Communion means to our own faith. Our presenter Sylvia Wang, a member of Redeemer, is a doctoral candidate in medieval art history at the University of Toronto. Please join her 7:30 – 9:00 PM on April 7.
