

Reader: A Reading from the First Book of Kings

Now when the Lord was about to take Elijah up to heaven by a whirlwind, Elijah and Elisha were on their way from Gilgal. Elijah said to Elisha, "Stay here; for the Lord has sent me as far as Bethel." But Elisha said, "As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So they went down to Bethel. Then Elijah said to him, "Stay here; for the Lord has sent me to the Jordan." But he said, "As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So the two of them went on. Fifty men of the company of prophets also went, and stood at some distance from them, as they both were standing by the Jordan. Then Elijah took his mantle and rolled it up, and struck the water; the water was parted to the one side and to the other, until the two of them crossed on dry ground. Sponsors: I present (Paige Cowan, Deb Deacon, John Deacon) to be received into this Communion.

The bishop then asks the following questions of all the candidates.

Bishop: Do you reaffirm your renunciation of evil?

Candidates: I do.

Bishop: Do you renew your commitment to Jesus Christ?

Candidates: I do.

Bishop: Do you put your whole trust in his grace and love?

Candidates: I do, and with God's grace I will follow him as my Saviour and Lord.

The congregation stands, the bishop addresses the people, saying,

Bishop: Will you who witness these vows do all in your power

to support these persons in their life in Christ?

People: We will.

Bishop: Let us join with those who commit themselves again to Christ

and renew our own baptismal covenant.

People: I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

was crucified, died, and was buried.

On the third day he rose again.

He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again to judge the living and the dead.

whenever you fall into sin, repent and return to the Lord?

People: I will, with God's help.

Bishop: Will you proclaim by word and example the good news of God in Christ?

Bishop: Will you seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbour as yourself?

People: I will, with God's help.

Bishop: Will you strive for justice and peace among all people,

and respect the dignity of every human being?

People: I will, with God's help.

Bishop: Will you strive to safeguard the integrity of God's creation, and respect, sustain and renew the life of the Earth?

People: I will, with God's help.

Bishop: May Christ dwell in your hearts through faith, that you may be rooted and grounded in love and bring forth the fruit of the Spirit.





Mid-day Prayer

Members of our community gather for mid-day prayer **Monday through Saturday** on Zoom at **12:15 PM**.
