First Reading

Reader: A Reading from the First Book of Kings

Now when the Lord was about to take Elijah up to heaven by a whirlwind, Elijah and Elisha were on their way from Gilgal. Elijah said to Elisha, "Stay here; for the Lord has sent me as far as Bethel." But Elisha said, "As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So they went down to Bethel. Then Elijah said to him, "Stay here; for the Lord has sent me to the Jordan." But he said, "As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So the two of them went on. Fifty men of the company of prophets also went, and stood at some distance from them, as they both were standing by the Jordan. Then Elijah took his mantle and rolled it up, and struck the water; the water was parted to the one side and to the other, until the two of them crossed on dry ground. High plains, prairies, hills and lowlands.



Unite us at this table of grace, so that each of us knows that we are cherished by you, and called to love each of your beloved.







Mid-day Prayer

Becoming Pilgrims – Upcoming Pilgrim Walks

The Becoming Pilgrims Committee invites you to our next three local pilgrimage walks. After the pilgrimage through the Pride Parade, the second local pilgrimage will be a "Beat the Bounds" walk along our traditional parish boundaries. It will start at **1:30pm on Sunday, July 10, 2022.** This walk will be led by Andrew Kuhl and Susan Haig. We will gather in front of the Redeemer. The walk will be less than 5 kilometres in length, and end at the Duke of York pub, where pilgrims can enjoy a pint and spend some time socializing with other Redeemer pilgrims.

Our third local pilgrimage will be along the waterfront and around the boardwalks located on the Toronto Islands. This walk will start **at 9:30am on Saturday, July 23, 2022**. We will start our walk by gathering at the Distillery District on Parliament Street (near Mill Street). We will walk south to the Martin Goodman Trail, and make our way west to the Toronto Ferry Terminal. From there, we will take a ferry across to Toronto Islands and complete our pilgrimage. Once the pilgrimage is completed, those who desire to do so may stay for lunch on the Island.
