





Opening Rite

We take time as a community to pause and to remember. In amongst the moments of new possibilities and times of enriched community, the past two and a half years have been times of grief, pain and loss. Covid-19 has taken beloved souls from family circles, caused economic hardship, and challenged how we care for our neighbour. This time has shone a light on injustice, inequity and racism that has always been there, but we have not always paid attention to. A candle shines in our midst as witness to the presence of the risen Christ. Today, we pause to hold space for all that has been lost and light candles in memory. We carry that light as we go back out into the world in hope and in joy.

Priest: When ancient Israel had suffered the great pain and tragedy of death and destruction, God said to them through the prophet Jeremiah:

Thus says the Lord:
A voice is heard in Ramah,
lamentation and bitter weeping.

Rachel is weeping for her children;
she refuses to be comforted for her children,
because they are no more.

Thus says the Lord:
Keep your voice from weeping,
and your eyes from tears;
for there is a reward for your work,
says the Lord:
there is hope for your future.

Jeremiah 31:15-17a

Priest: We gather reassured that God hears the lamentation and bitter weeping of all who have beloved souls they see no more because of the pandemic, of all who seek justice as we come to terms with systemic racism, of all who search for peace in a world broken apart. May we know healing of our grief-stricken hearts. May we know wisdom and guidance in speaking truth to power and injustice. May we turn in the direction of love and hope.



For this reason I remind you to rekindle the gift of God that is within you through the laying on of my hands; for God did not give us a spirit of cowardice, but rather a spirit of power and of love and of self-discipline.

Do not be ashamed, then, of the testimony about our Lord or of me his prisoner, but join with me in suffering for the gospel, relying on the power of God, who saved us and called us with a holy calling, not according to our works but according to his own purpose and grace. This grace was given to us in Christ Jesus before the ages began, but it has now been revealed through the appearing of our Saviour Christ Jesus, who abolished death and brought life and immortality to light through the gospel. For this gospel I was appointed a herald and an apostle and a teacher, and for this reason I suffer as I do. But I am not ashamed, for I know the one in whom I have put my trust, and I am sure that he is able to guard until that day what I have entrusted to him. Hold to the standard of sound teaching that you have heard from me, in the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. Guard the good treasure entrusted to you, with the help of the Holy Spirit living in us.


