

The Prayers of the People

Leader: One of the most repeated edicts in both the Old and New Testaments is 'to fear not.' Even when we hear of wars and uprisings, Jesus insists: 'Do not be frightened.' One of the best ways to not be frightened is to remind ourselves in prayer:

You are the God who rescues us

Leader: With your assurance O Lord that 'with joy we will draw water from the wells of salvation' -We pray for the many people without access to clean water, including dozens of First Nations communities, that with joy they draw clean water from their own wells.

We pray for those who are without work that they find meaningful and well paying employment. We pray for a just economy, where no one labours in vain, nor is mired in misfortune. We pray for those living on less than a livable wage that you enable them to thrive.

You are the God who rescues us

All: We will trust you and not be afraid.

Leader: With your assurance O Lord that 'the wolf and the lamb will feed together' and that 'we will not harm nor destroy on your holy mountain' -

We pray for peace in Ukraine, in Somalia, South Sudan, Syria and Afghanistan. We pray for basic human rights for women in Iran.

We pray that those countries suffering from our environmental misuse will be justly compensated.

We pray against disruptive forces both here and in the United States, which seek to divide and undermine us.

We pray that as Christians, we would be peacemakers, ever doing good, promoting the welfare of the poorest among us.

You are the God who rescues us

All: We will trust you and not be afraid.

Leader: With your assurance that when life is precarious, that we 'fear not' -

We pray for those people who lack either a home or family, that our church would be so welcoming they would find both home and family here.

That during this week of preparation for the Transgender Day of Remembrance, we remember and pray for transgender people who have been murdered, or have taken their own lives or have been injured and persecuted.

Help us to honour their identities and the identities of all people. Help us to create a world where everyone can live with authenticity and dignity. Help us all, who belong to every sexuality and gender, to live our own lives in true fulfilment of who you have made us to be, in fellowship with each other and in the love of Christ.

You are the God who rescues us

All: We will trust you and not be afraid.

Leader: We pray for those who are ill, that they would be healed. We pray for those who suffer, that you'd be their advocate and defence. We give thanks for those who have died and pray that you comfort all who mourn their passing.






We praise you, merciful Father, not as we ought, but as we are able, because in Priest: your tender love you gave the world your only Son, in order that the world might be saved through him. He made you known by taking the form of a servant, healing the sick, liberating the oppressed, reaching out to the lost. Betrayed, reviled, and nailed to the cross, he confronted the power of sin and disarmed it for ever. In his offering of himself, he became the perfect and sufficient sacrifice for the sins of the whole world. Redeemed by Christ, we have been adopted as your children; by your pardon you have made us worthy to praise you. On the night he was betrayed, Jesus, at supper with his friends, took bread, gave you thanks, broke the bread, gave it to them, and said, "Take and eat: this is my body which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me." After supper he took the cup of wine, and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this all of you: this is my blood which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me." In obedience to him and with grateful hearts we approach your holy table, remembering our Saviour's sacrifice, and rejoicing in his victory. Confident in his sovereign purpose, we declare our faith:

All: Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

- *Priest:* Send your Holy Spirit on us that as we receive this bread and this cup we may partake of the body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ, and feed on him in our hearts by faith with thanksgiving. May we be renewed in his risen life, filled with love, and strengthened in our will to serve others; and make of our lives, we pray, a pure and holy sacrifice, acceptable to you, knitting us together as one in your Son Jesus Christ, to whom, with you and the Holy Spirit, be all honour and glory, now and forever.




