Thirty years ago, First Interfaith Out of the Cold, a program that provides food, shelter, and care to the most marginalized in this city, opened its doors in the Annex. It now operates at St. Matthew's United Church on St. Clair Avenue West and continues to be a vital resource.

Indoor programs were perforce closed in March 2020, but the program pivoted to focus on the exploding crisis of food insecurity. Last season, from November to May FIOOTC provided ~10,000 nutritious lunches and hot dinners, clothing, and PPE kits to mobile street outreach programs (in partnership with Ve'ahavta, The Common Table program at Church of the Redeemer and Seeds of Hope) and to the local community at St. Matthew's. This year that same work continues. FIOOTC is entirely volunteer-run and relies solely on grants and donations. That's where you come in. If you're looking for a beautiful Christmas tree this season, and you'd like your traditional holiday decoration to deliver a positive social impact, consider buying a tree from Sonny's Christmas Trees at the lot at Brunswick and Bloor. Sonny and his family are happy to be back for another season.

As in previous years, they are generously donating a significant portion of their proceeds to the Out of the Cold program. Talk about a win/win tradition!

From **November 26 to December 18**, the lot is located on the patio beside Future's Bistro, 483 Bloor Street and is open daily from 10 AM - 8 PM.
