

He will come, will come, will come like crying in the night, like blood, like breaking, as the earth writhes to toss him free. He will come like child.





Reading 4: Matthew 1.18-25

Please be seated

Now the birth of Jesus the Messiah took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been engaged to Joseph, but before they lived together, she was found to be with child from the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a righteous man and unwilling to expose her to public disgrace, planned to dismiss her quietly. But just when he had resolved to do this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, for the child conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will bear a son, and you are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins.' All this took place to fulfil what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet: 'Look, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel', which means, 'God is with us.' 
The Great Thanksgiving



Refugee Settlement Committee Update - December 10, 2022 (International Human Rights Day) They're coming! The committee has heard that Abdikadir, Asho, and their sons will be arriving on January 26. We are all thrilled to hear a date for this long-expected arrival, and eager to meet the family.

Besides Abdikadir, in his mid-forties, and Asho, in her late thirties, there are six sons, ranging in age from 19 years to 9 months. The oldest, Zakaria, speaks some English and is interested in furthering his education to go into the field of medicine. Abdiaziz and Arafat are younger teenagers who speak Somali, but not English. The younger boys, Ahmed and Abdirizak, will learn English quickly once they are in school. Baby Ayub will grow up in Canada.

We may have a "landing spot" for them, but have not yet secured permanent housing, so don't know when move-in day will be. If you might be available to help on a Saturday in January, please contact <u>Susanna</u> Jacob (andorrajosej@gmail.com).
