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Transfiguration: "From the Latin "trans-" (across), and "figura" (form, shape). The Sunday before Lent we commemorate the story found in today's reading from Matthew, where Jesus is accompanied by a few disciples on a mountaintop. The disciples witness a transformation in Jesus where his face and clothes shine like the sun and he becomes radiant and glorious as the true Son of God. In the story, he is seen with Moses and Elijah, symbolizing the Law and the Prophets.


This greeting is called the "Apostolic Greeting" and is an amalgam of phrases that the Apostle St. Paul wrote in his letters to the various Christian communities he visited. They were intended as a blessing, words of reassurance to those who were struggling with the same issues each of us face on our own journey.

The author wrote

Christians a testimony: a statement of what being a Christian entails, how they should live in order to be judged worthy of the kingdom when Christ returns. Most scholars believe that the author was not Peter because, from internal evidence, it was not written until at least 90 AD, by which time Peter was dead. For example, it refers to Paul's letters as "scripture". His letters only became

part of the collection of Christian writings

long after Paul's

death.

Second Reading

Reader: A Reading from the Second Letter of Peter.

For we did not follow cleverly devised myths when we made known to you the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but we had been eyewitnesses of his majesty. For he received honour and glory from God the Father when that voice was conveyed to him by the Majestic Glory, saying, 'This is my Son, my Beloved, with whom I am well pleased.' We ourselves heard this voice come from heaven, while we were with him on the holy mountain.

So we have the prophetic message more fully confirmed. You will do well to be attentive to this as to a lamp shining in a dark place, until the day dawns and the morning star rises in your hearts. First of all you must understand this, that no prophecy of scripture is a matter of one's own interpretation, because no prophecy ever came by human will, but men and women moved by the Holy Spirit spoke from God.

The Gospel

Six days later, Jesus took with him Peter and James and his brother John and led them up a high mountain, by themselves. And he was transfigured before them, and his face shone like the sun, and his clothes became dazzling white. Suddenly there appeared to them Moses and Elijah, talking with him. Then Peter said to Jesus, 'Lord, it is good for us to be here; if you wish, I will make three dwellings here, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah.' While he was still speaking, suddenly a bright cloud overshadowed them, and from the cloud a voice said, 'This is my Son, the Beloved; with him I am well pleased; listen to him!' When the disciples heard this, they fell to the ground and were overcome by fear. But Jesus came and touched them, saying, 'Get up and do not be afraid.' And when they looked up, they saw no one except Jesus himself alone.

As they were coming down the mountain, Jesus ordered them, 'Tell no one about the vision until after the Son of Man has been raised from the dead.'



Matthew's gospel is the first in the New Testament. but it was probably the second to be written. **Scholars** recognize that it borrows material from Mark, and from sayings source containing sayings of Jesus and known as Q (for Quelle. German for source). The author shows an understanding of Jewish culture and religion not found in the other gospels. It was probably written about 60 to 70 AD, possibly for a largely Jewish audience.

Homily is from the Greek word "homilio" which means "conversation". The purpose of the homily (also known as the sermon) is to gather the themes of the readings together and articulate what they meant for those about whom they were written and what they mean for us, today.

Baptism is a coming into the greater community in faith, in which we become members of one another and of Christ - it is about who we are in Christ, and whose we are: God's own. In baptism we are gathered... and sent forth, as a people of God to the world. So. baptism is not just about identity and belonging, it's also about being sent in mission and ministry.

Water is poured into the font. The Priest blesses it saying,

The Lord be with you. Priest: **People:** And also with you.

Priest: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. *People:* It is right to give our thanks and praise.

Priest: We thank you, Almighty God, for the gift of water.

> Over water the Holy Spirit moved in the beginning of creation.

Through water you led the children of Israel

out of their bondage in Egypt into the land of promise.

In water your Son Jesus received the baptism of John

and was anointed by the Holy Spirit

as the Messiah, the Christ,

to lead us, through his death and resurrection, from the bondage of sin into everlasting life.

We thank you, Father, for the water of baptism. In it we are buried with Christ in his death. By it we share in his resurrection.

Through it we are reborn by the Holy Spirit.

Therefore in joyful obedience to your Son, we bring into his fellowship those who come to him in faith, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Now sanctify this water by the power of your Holy Spirit, that those who are here cleansed from sin and born again, may continue for ever in the risen life of Jesus Christ our Saviour. To him, to you, and to the Holy Spirit, be all honour and glory, now and for ever.

People: Amen.

The Baptism

The Priest then pours water over the candidate saying,

Priest: Mackenzie Douglas, I baptize you in the name of the Father,

and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

People: Amen.

The Priest makes the sign of the cross on the candidate's forehead saying,

Priest: I sign you with the cross, and mark you as Christ's own for ever.

The Priest prays over the newly baptized, saying,

Priest: Heavenly Father,

we thank you that by water and the Holy Spirit

you have bestowed upon Mackenzie the forgiveness of sin,

and have raised him to the new life of grace. Sustain him, O Lord, in your Holy Spirit. Give him an inquiring and discerning heart,

the courage to will and to persevere, a spirit to know and to love you,

and the gift of joy and wonder in all your works.

People: Amen.

The Giving of the Light

A candle is given to the newly baptized, the priest saying,

Priest: Receive the light of Christ,

to show that you have passed from darkness to light.

People: Let your light so shine before others

that they may see your good works and glorify your Father in heaven.

Matthew 5:23-24 talks about being reconciled before making an offering at the altar. Liturgically this relates to the practice of the peace where we have an opportunity to seek reconciliation before coming to the altar in the Eucharist. The peace we extend is the reconciling love of God to one another. We share the peace with each other through a nod, a handshake (if you are comfortable) or by raising our hand in the peace symbol.

The offering is our opportunity to worship God by giving back out of the abundance from which we have received. It is not obligatory to participate in the offertory, but the opportunity is there for all who wish to express their love and gratefulness to God through the giving of monetary gifts.

Priest: Let us welcome the newly baptized.

People: We receive you into the household of God.

Confess the faith of Christ crucified,

proclaim his resurrection,

and share with us in his eternal priesthood.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give our thanks and praise.

This hymn is called an "Offertory" because it is sund when we offer our gifts to God for all that we have been given. Our financial gifts, as well as bread and wine are brought before the altar and raised up as a symbol that in offering what sustains us, we might be a blessing to others.

The Eucharist (Greek for Thanksgiving) is a Christian ritual in which bread is eaten and wine is drunk as a way of showing devotion to Jesus Christ. Also known as "Communion" it is central to our life of faith and is practiced in most Christian churches in different forms. The Eucharist is an act of remembrance in which, by eating bread and drinking wine, the church recalls who Jesus Christ was, and the sacrifice he made for us.

The Sanctus (from the Latin word "holy") is an ancient hymn that is always sung during the Eucharistic Prayer. It is adapted from Isaiah-6.3, describing the prophet's vision of the throne of God. and from Matthew 21.9, where the people called out "Hosanna!" when Jesus entered Jerusalem.

Priest: Blessed are you, gracious God,

creator of heaven and earth;


you have revealed your eternal plan of salvation,

Therefore with angels and archangels we raise our voices in joyful praise to proclaim the glory of your name:

Sanctus: #732 (Common Praise)



Priest: We give thanks to you, Lord our God, for the goodness and love you have made known to us in creation; in calling Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus your Son.

For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Saviour and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you.

In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life. Priest: On the night he was handed over

to suffering and death, a death he freely accepted,

our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you,

he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said,

"Take, eat:

this is my body which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins.

Whenever you drink it,

do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore, Father, according to his command,

All: We remember his death, we proclaim his resurrection, we await his coming in glory;

Priest: and we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving

to you, Lord of all; presenting to you, from your creation,

this bread and this wine. We pray you, gracious God,

to send your Holy Spirit upon these gifts,

that they may be the sacrament

of the body of Christ

and his blood of the new covenant. Unite us to your Son in his sacrifice, that we, made acceptable in him, may be sanctified by the Holy Spirit.

In the fullness of time,

reconcile all things in Christ,

and make them new, and bring us to that city of light

where you dwell with all your children;

through Jesus Christ our Lord,

the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church,

and the author of our salvation;

by whom, and with whom, and in whom,


in the unity of the Holy Spirit,


All in the church are invited to come forward to receive communion. If you are wearing a mask, please keep it on while the priest offers you the bread.
