




TRANSGENDER DAY OF REMEMBRANCE

Commemoration of the departed

Priest: We light this first candle

We light this first candle to remember those transgender people we have loved and lost. We pause to remember their names, their faces, their voices, the memories that bind them to use in this season.

The first candle is lit

All: May God's eternal love surround them.

Priest: We light this second candle to redeem the pain of loss: the loss of relationships,

the loss of jobs, the loss of health. We pause to gather up the pain of the past and offer it to God, asking that from God's hands we receive the gift of peace.

The second candle is lit

All: Refresh, restore, renew us, O God, and lead us into your future.

Priest: We light this third candle to remember ourselves. We pause to recall these past weeks and months: the hurt, the anger, the down times, the joy and sorrow of memories, the hugs and handshakes of family, friends, and those who help and care for us. We give thanks for all the support we have known.

The third candle is lit

All: Let us remember that after every night comes the dawn of a new day.

Priest: We light this fourth candle to remember our faith and the gift of hope that the story of Jesus offers to us. We remember that God who shares our life, promises us a place and time of no more violence, pain, and suffering.

The fourth candle is lit

All: Let us remember the One who shows us the way, who brings the truth and who bears the light.

The names of the departed are read aloud. You are invited to come forward to light a candle in remembrance of those who have struggled in this city, in Canada, and across the world, especially those you love but see no longer.

to love all humanity no matter what


by revealing the breadth of your compassion

Priest: Holy One,

Priest: On the night in which he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus took bread, and gave you thanks; broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying:

After supper, he took the cup, gave you thanks, and gave it for all to drink, saying:
This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin.
Do this in the remembrance of me.
As we are made one body in you, so we proclaim the mystery of faith:

All: Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

Priest: Send now your life-giving Spirit upon this gathering of queer and straight, wondering and wonderful. Shine in us and reveal the arc of your love in the colours of our varied lives.

Sanctify this bread and wine so that, as we are blessed in Christ here and now, we may have the courage and strength to reach out to those feeling unloved, to advocate for those still facing rejection, and to seek justice, reconciliation, and healing for all.

Unite us at this table of grace, so that each of us knows that we are cherished by you, and called to love each of your beloved.

God of diversity, receive our offering as Jesus received each of us, with gratitude and joy.

Feed us with hope that we may continue our journey of loving whom we love and seeking your justice until all creation shines with your praise.

Creator of all, we pray to you

Through Jesus Christ our Lord, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, now and forever.

Spiritual Communion

Priest: Dear friends, I invite you in this moment, wherever you may be, to receive

Christ, in communion with the saints, and the gathering of God's people, unseen

and yet present with us now.

For those of us participating at home, it is a strange experience to be invited to Communion - not through the physical bread and wine we can touch and taste but a Spiritual Communion with the God who comes to meet us wherever we are.

There are no special words or prayers for this, all the Church has ever thought necessary is genuine true desire, lively faith, and genuine love. Come honestly before God the way you know how.

You may wish to pray quietly this prayer to help you:

Lord, you stand at the door of my heart and knock. One:

You wait for me and only I can let you in.

I believe and trust in you and ask you now to fill me with your presence.

Feed me with your body and unite me in your blood, that I may be your blessing to a world in need. Amen.



All in the church are invited to come forward to receive communion. If you need a gluten-free wafer, please indicate this to the priest.

If you would like to receive a blessing rather than communion, please cross your arms as shown in the picture and the clergy will be pleased to offer you a blessing.

Intinction is the practice of dipping the bread or wafer into the wine when receiving communion.

This practice is not allowed in churches in the Diocese of Toronto, including the Church of the Redeemer, for health and safety reasons.
