
Psalm 32, Lent 4C

Introduction. Cantor sings refrain. All repeat refrain. Cantor sings verses. All sing refrain after each group of verses. In the psalm-tone the singer leaves the reciting note on the underlined word or syllable.



- (1) Happy are they whose transgressions <u>are</u> forgiven,
- (2) and whose sin is <u>put</u> away!
- (3) Happy are they to whom God imputes no guilt,
- (4) and in whose spirit there is \underline{no} guile! R.
- (1) While I held my tongue, my bones withered away,
- (2) because of my groaning all day long.
- (3) For your hand was heavy upon me day and night;
- (4) my moisture was dried up as in the heat \underline{of} summer. R.
- (1) Then I acknowledged my sin to you,
- (2) and did not con<u>ceal</u> my guilt.
- (3) I said, "I will confess my transgressions to <u>God</u>."
- (4) Then you forgave me the guilt of \underline{my} sin. \overline{R} .
- (1) Therefore all the faithful will make their prayers to you in time of trouble;
- (2) when the great waters overflow, they $\underline{\text{shall}}$ not reach them.
- (3) You are my hiding-place; you preserve me from <u>trou</u>ble;
- (4) you surround me with shouts of <u>deliverance</u>. R.
- (1) "I will instruct you and teach you in the way that you should go;
- (2) I will guide you with my eye.
- (3) Do not be like horse or mule, which have no understanding;
- (4) who must be fitted with bit and bridle, or else they will not <u>stay</u> near you." **R**.

- (1) Great are the tribulations of the wicked;
- (2) but mercy embraces those who <u>trust</u> in God.
- (3) Be glad, you righteous, and rejoice in God;
- (4) shout for joy, all who are true of heart. \mathbf{R} .
