


Psalm 90. 1-6, 13-17



Introduction



Teach us to num - ber our days.



- (1) God, You have been our refuge
- (2) from one generation to another
- (3) Before the mountains were brought forth,
- (3) or the land and the earth were born,
- (4) from age to age you are God. **R.**

- (1) You turn us back to dust and say,
- (2) "Go back, O child of earth."
- (3) For a thousand years in your sight are
like yesterday when it is past
- (4) and like a watch in the night. **R.**

- (1) You sweep us away like a dream;
- (2) we fade away suddenly like the grass.
- (3) In the morning it is green and flourishes;
- (4) in the evening it is dried up and withered. **R.**

- (1) Return, O God. how long will you tarry?
- (2) be gracious to you servants.

- (1) Satisfy us by your loving-kindness in the morning;
- (2) so shall we rejoice and be glad all the days of our life.
- (3) Make us glad by the measure of the days that you afflicted us
- (4) and the years in which we suffered adversity. **R.**

- (1) Show your servants your works
- (1) and your splendour to their children
- (2) May the graciousness of our God be upon us;
- (3) prosper the work of our hands;
- (4) prosper our handiwork. **R.**
